WRITERS OF THE NEW TESTAMENT

The writers compiled a written record of what God had brought to their remembrance and what he directed them to convey. They wrote with the same authority as they spoke.

Paul wrote:

If anyone thinks he is a prophet or spiritual, let him recognize that the things which I write to you are the Lord's commandment. 1 Corinthians 14:37

Peter equated his writings and those of Paul to the Scriptures (Holy Writings) of the Old Testament:

... and regard the patience of our Lord to be salvation; just as also our beloved brother Paul, according to the wisdom given him, wrote to you, as also in all his letters, speaking in them of these things, in which are some things hard to understand, which the untaught and unstable distort, as they do also the rest of the Scriptures, to their own destruction. 2 Peter 3:16-16

John wrote down what he had witnessed, so that all might believe that Jesus was the promised Messiah, the Savior of sinners, and the Son of God; that, by this faith, they might obtain eternal life:

Many other signs therefore Jesus also performed in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these have been written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing you may have life in His name.

Also called Lucas

Worker with Paul. Phm.24, Act.27:1

Wrote: LUKE, ACTS

*Luke included himself in some of the activities by using the pronoun, "we" in Acts.

Brother of James the Apostle

Originally a disciple of John the Baptist. Joh. 1:35-40

His brother, James, was put to death by Herod Agrippa I. Acts. 12:1-2

Also called Simon, Simeon, Cephas

Fishing partner with James, John and Andrew, Luk.5:7,10, Mar.1:16

Wrote: 1 PETER, 2 PETER

JAMES

Hebrew: Jacob

Some think he was a cousin to the Lord; others think he was "James the less."






